Jesus prays we not be taken from this world.

Peter says we are to live good lives amongst the pagans.

John indicates we are to do God's will in the world.

Living a Seduced Life

Do not love the world or anything in the world. If anyone loves the world, love for the Father is not in them. For everything in the world—the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life—comes not from the Father but from the world. The world and its desires pass away, but whoever does the will of God lives forever.

1 John 2:15-17





When Jesus broached this subject in John 17:14-16 he focused on the confrontation what we deal with

He follows it up with "But to you who are listening I say: Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you,"

Now John is coming in saying love them but do not be in love with them





to persuade to disobedience or disloyalty

to lead astray usually by persuasion or false promises

to attracts someone to a belief or into a course of action that is inadvisable or foolhardy



"When our emotions are engaged, we often have trouble seeing things as they are."

"It is both imitative and competitive "

"Seduction is a game of psychology, not beauty, and it is within the grasp of any person to become a master at the game. All that is required is that you look at the world."



To make something Seductive you must make it attractive

Seduction is gradual

Seduction is comparative

Ultimately you must choose to be seduced





John Starts out both this point and the next with the word lust

The technical definition is to have an intense desire or need.

When you follow that word you get to have a strong or inward desire





In scripture Flesh always connects itself too physical

We all have physical needs

Those physical needs are the easy in for the concept of lust

Lust begins when we become obsessed with meeting the need

How do you measure your life successful


